

Noun phrases

A noun phrase is made up of two or more words and can be replaced by a pronoun like 'they' or 'them'.

For example '**The books'** is a noun phrase. It contains a determiner 'the' and a noun 'books'.

Do you like the books?

Yes, I like them because they are interesting!

Tense

Verbs are words which express actions and we must look at these to determine the tense of the sentence.

Past simple – the action took place in the past and is now finished.

I walked to my friend's house.

Present simple – the action takes place regularly.

I walk to my friend's house.

Co-ordinating conjunctions

A co-ordinating conjunction joins two clauses of equal value or importance in a sentence.

I like swimming and my brother likes football.

We might go to the cinema or we could go to the funfair.

I want to wear my sunhat, but it is raining.

Subordinating conjunctions

A subordinating conjunction introduces a subordinate clause (a clause that does not make sense on its own).

We couldn't do PE today because it was raining.
